

Fairhaven Board of Selectmen Meeting Minutes December 21, 2020

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FAIRHAVEN, MASS.

Present: Chairman Daniel Freitas Vice-Chairman Robert Espindola, Selectman Keith Silvia, Town Administrator Mark Rees, Fairhaven Fire Chief Timothy Francis and Deputy Todd Correia and Cable Access Director Derek Frates

Diane Hahn requested to record the message via Zoom.

Chairman Freitas opened the meeting at 6:32 pm in the Town Hall Banquet Room and read the following statement:

"This Open Meeting of the Fairhaven Board of Selectmen is being conducted remotely consistent with Governor Baker's Executive Order of March 12, 2020, due to the current State of Emergency in the Commonwealth due to the outbreak of the "COVID-19 Virus."

In order to mitigate the transmission of the COVID-19 Virus, we have been advised and directed by the Commonwealth to suspend public gatherings, and as such, the Governor's Order suspends the requirement of the Open Meeting Law to have all meetings in a publicly accessible physical location. Further, all members of public bodies are allowed and encouraged to participate remotely.

The Order, which you can find posted with agenda materials for this meeting allows public bodies to meet entirely remotely so long as reasonable public access is afforded so that the public can follow along with the deliberations of the meeting.

Ensuring public access does not ensure public participation unless such participation is required by law. This meeting will allow public comment related to the posted agenda items only. For this meeting, Fairhaven Board of Selectmen is convening by telephone conference/video conference via Zoom App as posted on the Town's Website identifying how the public may join.

Town Administrator's Report

Mr. Rees thanked the Board and wished everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. Mr. Rees reminded them this would be his last Board of Selectmen's meeting, as he will be retiring on January 7, 2021. The Board all wished him well and thanked him for his years of service to Fairhayen.

Committee Liaison Report

Mr. Silvia told the Board that he attended the Cable Advisory Committee meeting. Mr. Silvia said Cable Access has covered over 260 meetings this year.

Cable Access Director Derek Frates addressed a complaint letter that was recently received by the Board. Mr. Frates said that his office does not edit any of the meetings in public session noting that the broadcast starts once the meeting is in session. Meetings are filmed two ways, off site and live, when the meeting is in recess the microphone is muted not edited. Mr. Freitas thanked Mr. Frates for his hard work.

Mr. Espindola said the Broadband Study Committee has put out a request for proposal (RFP) for a project. The Broadband Committee is also working on communication with other communities.

Acknowledgement of Fire Chief Timothy Francis for service

Chairman Freitas read a proclamation recognizing Fire Chief Timothy Francis for his heroic effort when he saved a woman from choking while having breakfast in November. Chief Francis said he was very humbled for the acknowledgement. The Board thanked the Chief and wished him well on his upcoming retirement. (Attachment A)

Interim Town Administrator

Mr. Rees reminded the Board that there will need to be an interim Town Administrator to fill the gap between his retirement and when the Town will hire a permanent Town Administrator.

Mr. Silvia said he would like to have Finance Director Wendy Graves fill in as the interim Town Administrator. Mr. Espindola agreed that Ms. Graves would do a great job but he is worried that this may be a tough as she already has a heavy work load as Treasurer/Collector/Finance Director. Mr. Silvia suggested having Town Accountant Anne Carreiro as the assistant interim Town Administrator. Mr. Espindola would like to hire someone outside of the town employees for the position. Mr. Freitas feels that hiring an interim from inside would be beneficial to the town because this person would already know the town and the operations.

Mr. Freitas made a motion to have Mr. Rees discuss having Finance Director Wendy Graves fill in as the interim Town Administrator and Town Accountant Anne Carreiro as the assistant interim Town Administrator and to keep the costs under \$75 per hour. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote passed. (2-1)

Town Administrator Search Committee

Mr. Espindola made a motion to accept the resignation of Anne Carreiro on the Town Administrator Search Committee. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0)

Public Works Superintendent Vincent Furtado was in attendance via Zoom and told the Board he was approached by Town Counsel when it appeared there would be a vacancy. Mr. Furtado said that he would have no problem stepping side if there was someone else interested in serving on the committee.

Mr. Espindola made a motion to appoint Superintendent Linda Schick serve in the vacant seat. There was no second.

Mr. Silvia made a motion to appoint business owner Cathy Melanson to the vacant seat. Mr. Freitas seconded. Vote passed. (2-1)

Melanson Heath-Building Department Permit Fee Review

Melanson and Health Auditor Zach Fentross and Building Commissioner Chris Carmichael met with the Board via Zoom to discuss the recent audit in the Building Department. Mr. Rees explained there was a review of the building department due to a change in revenue on the building department fees. Mr. Rees told the Board the new building commissioner Chris Carmichael has been proactive in implementing an online permitting system that will help streamline the permitting process and will also bring in a new fee schedule.

Mr. Fentross stated that this was not a forensic file investigation, but was merely put in place to help come up with some internal controls to help make improvement to the building department. Mr. Fentross made several recommendations including having the Town Accounting Department get quarterly reports from the department, revising fee schedules to remove subjective calculations and additional training to the department's administrative assistant to improve the understanding when calculating fees. Mr. Fentross would like to have Town Counsel review the legality of the changes that Melanson and Heath has recommended. (Attachment B)

Mr. Carmichael told the Board that he was hired half way through this audit and he feels the pricing is very subjective. Mr. Carmichael would like to present the new pricing to the Board at their next meeting.

Street Light Placement - Reservation Road

Mr. Rees reminded the Board that town meeting voters approved the street light on Reservation Road at the October 20, 2020 Special Town Meeting. Mr. Rees said he would need to speak with Town Counsel to find out if the Board of Selectmen could overturn a town meeting vote.

Reservation Road resident Susan Sullivan told the Board she doesn't feel that the light should be put up because there are already enough streetlights on that road and this light would shine into her house. She feels because there are no children in the neighborhood and anyone who is walking at night should carry a flashlight and not wear dark clothing. (Attachment C)

Petitioner of the light Jeff Adesso told the Board he has done some research and the glare on the light can be adjusted so they don't shine on Mrs. Sullivan's residence.

Mr. Rees will discuss with Town Counsel and Public Works Superintendent, Vinnie Furtado for the next meeting.

Small Boat/Lobster Basin Fee

Harbormaster Tim Cox met with the Board via Zoom to ask the Board to approve a 10% increase in the lobster basin fee at Union Wharf. Harbormaster Cox said the fees have not been increased in three years. Mr. Cox said there are plans to have metered water brought to Union wharf for the lobstermen to use. Mr. Espindola said at a recent Marine Resources Committee meeting they felt this was not the year to the increase in the fee because of COVID.

Mr. Silvia made a motion to increase the fees 10% as long as the water will be brought in. Mr. Freitas seconded. Vote passed. (2-1)

Electricity Aggregation Program-Good Energy

At 8:27 Selectman Espindola recused himself because he runs an energy consulting business.

Mr. Rees told the Board Good Energy will be sending out information and a press release to residents regarding the 10% increase in the renewable energy. (Attachment D)

Daria Mark and John O'Rourke from Good Energy met via Zoom with the Board to answer any questions the Board may have. Selectmen Silvia suggested having the information posted on the movable electronic sign to inform the residents of the changes.

Mr. Espindola returned to the room.

FY22 General Fund Revenue projection

Finance Director Wendy Graves told the Board, via Zoom, that she and Mr. Rees have put together the revenue projections for a balanced budget for the next 5 years as the first step in developing the FY22 budget and took a very conservative approach on the estimates. (Attachment E)

Notes and Announcements

Mr. Espindola congratulated the Prize-a Palooza on a very successful virtual fundraiser this year for the Neediest Family Fund.

Mr. Freitas addressed the residents who would like to start a Diversity Inclusion and Equity Committee, stating that he would like to see this on a future agenda once the Town has hired a permanent Town Administrator.

Board members wished Mr. Rees a very Happy Retirement.

The Board wished residents a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Mr. Espindola made a motion to adjourn at 8:47 p.m. Mr. Silvia seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0)

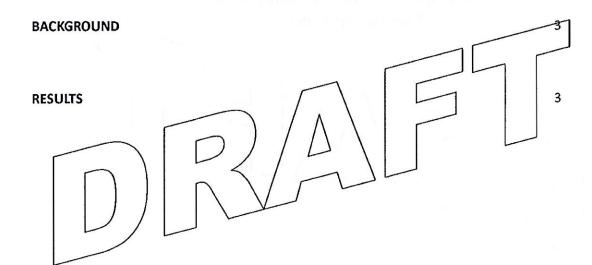

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES OVER BUILDING DEPARTMENT

Mr. Mark Rees Town Administrator Town of Fairhaven, Massachusetts

We performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by the Town Administrator, on the Building Department. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures enumerated below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures are as follows:-

- Determine the sources of revenue for the department, including a detailed listing of source, type, frequency, and expectations of future revenue to be received.
- Provide the Town with a methodology that can be applied by the Town to perform similar internal audits in the future.
- Through inquiry, review all Building Inspection Fees, (Building, Plumbing, Gas, Electrical) to determine if the structure and design of the fee schedules are such that the calculation of fees for projects is open to interpretation as to how those fees are calculated and if so, make specific recommendations as to how better standardize the calculation so that results are same regardless of who does the calculation.
- Turnover in the Department resulted in changes our original procedures. Based on discussion
 with Town Administrator, we conducted a series of phone interview with Department and
 Town personnel to assess procedures used by the department in assessing fees, however, we
 did not conduct a fraud or forensic investigation.

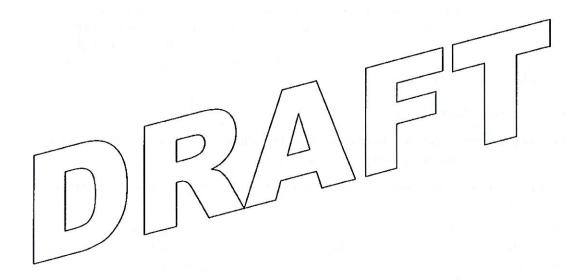
We have summarized the results of our procedures in the accompanying report.

This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. We were not

engaged to and did not conduct an examination or a review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on the Building Department. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures; additional matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Town and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than those specified parties.

BACKGROUND

The Town wants to develop expectations for future revenue projections to aid the Accounting Department in their review of reasonableness of account balances. Furthermore, the Town believes the structure of the Building Department permit fee schedule is open to interpretation and wanted a review of the process including the possibility of misappropriation of assets. The Town engaged us to perform the procedures specified earlier in the Building Department as of the above noted dated.

RESULTS

Based on our inquiry we observed the following:

- Most of the personnel we spoke with think that unintentional errors may have occurred in the assessment of fee as the design of the fee schedule is open to interpretation. One individual asserted that a favorable fee was assessed to a related party.
- We were provided an electrical permit where the fee charged was at the resident all rate and not the commercial rate. We do not know the nature of the error as we were not engaged to perform a fraud examination.
- We were informed that three different individuals calculated fees for electrical permits, and each came up with a different fee for the same project.
- A new Building Commission has been hired and is implementing an on-line permitting system to assist with transparency of all permits issued. We understand the new software should aid in eliminating fee calculation errors and standardizing the process.
- We understand that the new Commissioner intends on bringing a new fee schedule to the Board also to help eliminate calculations that are open to interpretation.

Based on procedures performed and our inquiry we recommend the following:

- The Town and new Building Commissioner should consult with counsel in respect to approval
 of permits in accordance with state law.
- The Town should provide additional training to the Department's Administrative Assistant to improve the understanding when calculating fees.
- Each fee calculation should have a secondary review by a knowledgeable individual to ensure
 the appropriate fee is assessed. Understanding the time constraints when issuing permits,
 such a secondary review could be performed after the permit is issued to the completeness
 and accuracy of the fee assessed. Such a secondary review should help eliminate any question
 about related parties.
- Review the fee schedule with industry consultants to improve the transparency and remove elements of interpretation.

- Internal audit programs have been provided to the Town under separate cover.
- Improve Town-wide internal controls over permitting by sending the Accounting Department quarterly reports from the new on-line permitting system as a tool to match against amounts remitted to the Town Treasurer.
- Long-term revenue projections should be based on rolling 5-year averages adjusted for current economic environment.

APPEAL FOR PROPOSED STREET LIGHT ON POLE 216-3

Thank you for the opportunity to present this appeal to the board. This appeal is in response to a petition for a street light to be added to pole 216-3 on Reservation Rd. This petition was at first rejected by the recent Town Meeting and was then overturned after Jeff Adesso argued for it.

As a point of note, our house at 14 Reservation Rd. stands directly opposite this pole and we were never told of this petition.

This additional street light would be a direct beam into our second floor, affecting bedroom and bathroom. We already have one street light at pole 103-11, that shines directly into our second floor living room. The shade needs to be pulled down at all times during the night. In the warmer seasons, we are unable to open the window to let in air due to the shade. If this additional light goes in, that would mean all the windows facing Reservation Rd. in both bathroom and bedroom would have to remain closed or having flapping shades all night.

It is our understanding that there are already the required number of lights on our street. It was said that it is a dangerous corner. This is a quiet street with very little traffic. This has been our residence for close to 16 years and we have never seen one accident. In fact, it is more lit than some other parts of the street since there are houses lining both sides — all with outdoor lighting at night. If this is a reason, then every pole should have a street light on it. The few walkers who are out at night should be responsible and always wear bright clothing, carry flashlights and/or wear headlights for their own safety, no matter where they are walking after dark.

It was also brought up that there is an "autistic child" who lives on this street. Firstly, this "child" is neither "autistic" nor a "child". It is our understanding that he is an adult close to 50 years old with special needs. Mr. Adesso should show him the respect he deserves. Why his handicap was even entered into the argument, we have no idea. Secondly, the house Mr. Adesso refers to has a street light in the both the front and back of this property. As for children playing in the street, there are no children living in this neighborhood and we have never seen children playing in the street after dark.

Since learning of this petition, we have spoken to some of our neighbors who had initially signed it and explained what it would mean for our family. In some cases, we were told that it really did not make much of a difference to them (didn't even remember signing petition) and would be just as willing to do without another light. After speaking with another neighbor, he agreed that the money would be better spent on the bike path signal light. All of the people that we spoke with on the petition were surprised to learn that no one bothered to inform us. Some of these people have lived here longer than we have with the existing street lights. Why the need now? As full-time, permanent residents, we see nothing that has changed to justify this added expense to the town.

Additionally, this extra street light will be an extra \$800 cost to the town. We feel this can best be spent elsewhere. If lighting is an issue, let's fix the solar traffic light at the Bike Path crossing on Sconticut Neck which we fought so hard for while serving the Farihaven Biike Committee. This is a much more effective use of our taxpayer dollars.

In closing, we have no desire to start a neighborhood feud. We only wish to continue living in Fairhaven, the town we chose to retire to, in peace and comfort.

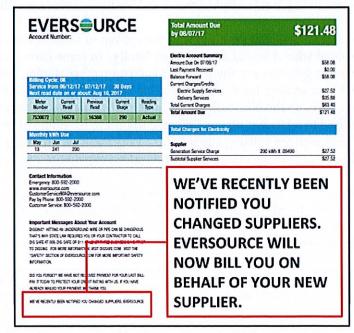

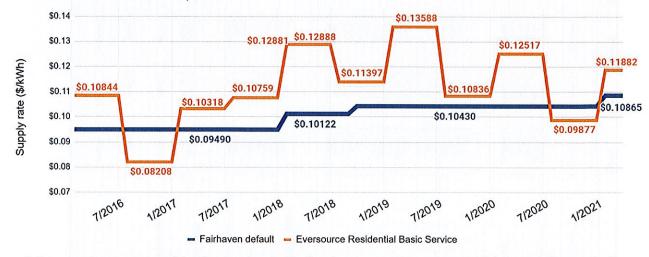
